

Upwardly Global Reaches New Heights in 2022, Charts Path in 2023



Last year we helped more immigrant and refugee job seekers than ever previously in our 20 years: some 6,500 individuals, including hundreds of Afghans and Ukrainians, and others from Venezuela to Ethiopia and far beyond. We offered industry specific coaching, built the capacity of partner organizations serving immigrants and refugees, and shared career development tools. Average

tracked starting salary was close to \$67,000, and we added over \$70 Million to our economy in new combined wages. As we look ahead, Upwardly Global is about to hit a milestone: 10,000 individuals supported into family-wage jobs. We hope to celebrate with you in the coming months. We are watching the jobs situation carefully, but for now are seeing steady demand for the skills and services of our immigrant and refugee professional community. And we are working to offer services to thousands more and build scale, as the importance of workforce inclusion for immigrants and refugees

Upwardly Global Releases New Report on Workforce Inclusion for Young Immigrants

In December 2022, Upwardly Global released a groundbreaking new report, "Roadblocks to Workforce Inclusion for Immigrant Young Adults," on the unique challenges young adult immigrants face on their employment journeys. We heard from healthcare workers, legal professionals, project managers, physical therapists, journalists, software engineers, human resources professionals, and more about their common thread – navigating the U.S. job market as an outsider. The report finds that 60% of young immigrants believe their professional skills are not fully valued at work, with that number climbing to over 70% for immigrants of color.


